



A journey of discovery



Caroline Hodgson reflects on Luke 20:27-38

o you remember being very young? Perhaps you can remember having no notion that life was anything other than how you perceived it. Your whole world consisted of your mother's womb, then your cot, your room, and so on. As you grew, developed and explored, you started to reshape your concepts about life and the world, and to recognise possibilities and new horizons. Perhaps you learnt about pain through crawling towards something and bumping your head against it. You started to learn about friendship, love, sorrow and loss. You started to understand that everything comes to an end, but then you learnt that each end contains within it the makings of a new beginning – when a leaf falls from a tree it decomposes on the ground, enriching the soil and creating the conditions for new life.

The Sadducees in today's Gospel reading had a failure of imagination, and were dogmatically and doctrinally boxed into fixed ideas. They assumed the afterlife to be a mere continuation of earthly existence. They were also meanspirited in trying to trap Jesus. But Jesus is not to be contained, and comes back with the wonderful image of those who have died an earthly death as "like angels... children of God... children of the resurrection".

Childhood is, and should be, a time of discovery, wonder and awe, of finding freedom and learning. We can never know what awaits us the other side of the grave, and it would be a mistake to limit ourselves – in this life or the next. 荸

Whether you hear that word, "creed", and think instinctively of a great choir belting out the first movement of Bach's B Minor Mass, or find yourself wondering what you actually believe yourself, you can't spend long in most Christian churches without engaging with some kind of statement of faith. Recently I was present as my

diocese formally cemented a

partnership with an Anglican diocese in Kenya - and, before anything was signed and sealed, right at the centre of the liturgy, English and Kenyans standing together were asked to proclaim the Apostles'Creed. It mattered, you see, that we knew we were part of the same family, able to express clearly what we shared as the foundation for our new relationship. Despite the differences in our contexts, we stood united by the fundamental truths that characterise the life and faith of a Christian – and that is the key purpose of those statements that we use Sunday by Sunday. 👻

Gospel Reading

Luke 20. 27-38

Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to him and asked him a question, 'Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. Now there were seven brothers; the first married, and died childless; then the second and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her.'

Jesus said to them, 'Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. Indeed they cannot die any more, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive.'

Second Reading

2 Thessalonians 2. 1-5, 13-17

As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here. Let no one deceive you in any way; for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you?

But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. For this purpose he called you through our proclamation of the good news, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter.

Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.
